The Present Perfect Tense Uses have and has to indicate a completed action.			Direct speech This is when you write the exact words spoken. These words are punctuated with speech marks (inverted commas).			

Simple past tense → He went out to play.

Present perfect tense — He has gone out to play.

Definition			
A word that adds more information about verbs, adjectives or other adverbs			
Has a main clause (makes sense on its own) and at least one subordinate clause (doesn't make sense on its own)			
The letters in the alphabet which are not vowels (a,e,i,o,u)			
The exact words spoken			
Can form a complete sentence on its own			
Connected sentences about one idea or theme			
Verb form used to describe things that happened in the past			
Indicates a completed action e.g. He has gone out to play			
Verb form used to describe things happening right now			
Punctuation used to show what has been spoken or said			
Is dependent on a main clause. It doesn't make sense on its own			
The letters a,e,i,o,u
