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Scale	Scale is the size of one		
	object in relation to the		
	other objects in a design		
	or artwork.		
Blending	To mix enough so that		
	there no longer seem to be		
	separate parts or		
	ingredients.		
Proportion	The relationship of the size		
	of one element of a		
	drawing when compared		
	to another.		
Foreground	The part of a work of		
	art that appears to be in		
	the front, nearest to the		
	viewer, usually in the		
	lower part of the picture.		
Middle	The middle ground is		
Ground	usually in the centre of the		
	picture and is the focal		
	point.		
Background	The part of a scene or		
	picture that is farthest		
	from the viewer: the part		
	of a scene that is behind a
