Fact Bank

Easter in Spain is famous for its “**Semana Santa**” (Holy Week) processions. Local brotherhoods called “**cofradías**” carry large, decorated floats (**pasos**) with statues of Jesus and Mary through the streets. People dress in traditional robes, and tall, pointed hoods. It's a time for families to come together, watch the processions and sometimes eat special treats.
