



1. Which year is your child in?




2. During lockdown was your child?




3. During the last lockdown, do you think the school's response to switching to remote/home learning was:



4. During lockdown on average, how much home learning was your child able to do every day?




The creative lessons like building, drawing, creating pieces of work. Also the online games were really good and engaging.





Due to having younger siblings and house chores I found this very challenging


9. How easy was it for you/or your child to get help from school if you had a problem with home learning?




10. Are you worried about your child falling behind with their learning because of the last lockdown?




11. Would you be happy for your child to attend extra lessons after school to help them catch up with lost learning?



12. Are you worried about your child's wellbeing being affected by the last lockdown?




13. During lockdown did the school offer ideas and advice to keep your child fit and healthy at home?




15. What would the main difficulties be for you if the school (or a class "bubble") had to return to home learning in the future? (Computer equipment, Work/Life balance etc)
